Strategies for grading efficiently:

- Attendance Checks
- PEW Responses
- Level 2 Exam questions
- Audio Feedback

I. Attendance Checks:

- A. Overview
 - Attendance grade earned by completing class activities
 - Done for a completion grade so are quick to grade but call for student engagement
 - Each activity is low stakes, but they add up to 10-15% of the course grade
 - I assign more than are needed so that a few can be dropped, and with this I don't usually allow make ups
- B. Examples
 - 1. Short responses to a prompt to elicit class discussion
 - 2. During small group discussions, a "recorder" takes notes
 - 3. Padlets
 - 4. D2L Surveys
 - 5. Kahoots

II. PEW Responses:

Students write a 3-4 sentence response to an interpretative question about a reading assignment. Students must include a <u>Position</u>, textual <u>Evidence</u>, and an explanation of how or <u>W</u>hy the evidence supports the position. I usually assign these outside of class, but they could also be done in class. I use a rubric for grading, so they are quick to grade but call upon students to utilize high level thinking.

- III. Level 2 and 3 Exam Questions: Exam questions that require higher level thinking, such as synthesizing and applying knowledge rather than just memorization. Examples can be found on the ppt. linked below.
- IV. Audio Feedback: Voice record feedback when grading both major and minor assignments
