**Course Description:**

3 Class Hours

Prerequisite: Successful completion of all Learning Support English requirements, including ENGL 1101 if required.

This course examines the major themes in the social, cultural, political, and economic history of the United States since 1877, the multicultural nature of contemporary U.S. civilization, and the nation’s role in the global arena.

**Learning Objectives:** This course is intended to help the student to develop the skills of critical thinking and competences necessary to be a lifelong learner.

**HIST 2111/HIST 2112** satisfies one of Kennesaw State University's General Education program requirements. Specifically, it addresses the US Perspectives learning outcome. The learning outcomes states: Students will demonstrate a broad understanding of history, political systems, or culture of the U.S.. ### **Required Reading:**

There is no required book. All reading material will be supplied and posted on D2L.

### **Attendance Policy:**

Regular attendance is **required!** Why? Studies have shown a direct correlation between class attendance and success. **That is success in class and life period.** It is pointed out that participation represents 10% of the overall grade prorated over the number of class sessions. Attendance will be taken each day and students are responsible for making sure they sign the attendance sheet that day, **not the next week**. Students are solely responsible for managing their enrollment status in a class; nonattendance does not constitute a withdrawal.

### **Electronic Devices Policy:**

The short version: A little respect goes a long way. If you promise not to use your cell phone in class, I promise not to ask you what you're doing. If you want to be embarrassed, pull your iPhone out and start texting.

Laptop use in class is not allowed without my personal permission. If you want to use a laptop to take notes in class, you need to introduce yourself to me at the start of the semester and explain why the laptop is necessary. Afterwards, I reserve the right to ask you during or at the end of any class period to show me the work you have completed on the computer; I also reserve the right to revoke laptop privileges. Excessive side-conversations, passing notes, etc. are things that distract you, your classmates and me. The above listed, and any other, disruptions of class could result in

a reduction of your final grade and, if serious enough, could result in removal from the class and/or withdrawal from the course.

- Exam 1: 20 multiple-choice questions and five short-answer questions (answering four of them).
- Exam 2: 40 multiple-choice questions.
- Exam 3: 20 multiple-choice questions and five short-answer questions (answering four of them).
- Exam 4: 40 multiple-choice questions.
- The exams will be administered through D2L.
- There will be 60 minutes to complete the exam.
- Moreover, under no circumstances email me after the final exam asking to have your grade rounded up. All grades will be rounded to the nearest single digit. That mean 79.5 will be rounded to 80 and 79.4 will be rounded to 79.
- The calendar assigns a chapter to a specific day. On that day you will be asked to submit one question about that chapter. Not the next week. The discussion will be closed the next and no opportunity will be given to makeup.

**Exams and Discussion Questions:** Exams will be administrated online through D2L. There will five multiple choice questions for each chapter and each exam will cover four chapters. Total time for the exam will be 30 minutes and will be available to take for 48 hours on the days indicated in the class schedule.

For each chapter, you are required to submit a discussion question. Chapter readings are scheduled to be completed by Wednesday and the Question no later than midnight Wednesday, at which time the Discussion Forum will be closed for that chapter. You will receive either a 0, .5, or 1 point.

**Makeup Exams and Late Assignments:**

Assignments are due on a specific date. Failure to turn in assignment on assigned days will result in a **0**.

**Note:** The Department will host a day for makeup exams for students with excused absences at the end of each semester. Students will need to bring an ID to the makeup exam. This is not a required makeup solution. It does simplify the process for makeup exams by shifting this work to one day at the end of the semester
