Course Description:

This course is part of the General Education Program at Kennesaw State. It is intended in part to familiarize you with the discipline of philosophy. In this course we will look at some of the traditional questions that have interested philosophers from many cultures and many times. These questions include how and what we know about our world, ourselves, and our ethical responsibilities within this context. Furthermore, we will look at how philosophy and philosophical thinking relate to other disciplines and how philosophy might help us in thinking about and understanding everyday questions and problems.

- A familiarity with the vocabulary of philosophy, its major concepts, the historical development and consequences of these concepts, and methods of philosophical inquiry within western and non-western traditions;
- An understanding of the different contexts and criteria for knowledge;
- An understanding of human diversity and the differing values that arise from diverse points of view; and
- An understanding of the relationship of philosophy to the other disciplines and areas of inquiry

Required Reading:

Voices of Wisdom: A Multicultural Philosophy Reader, edited by Gary Kessler, 9th edition There are also some readings on D2L. I have put the first few reading on D2L in case you don't yet have your book, but by the second week of class you will need the book.

Attendance Policy:

Students are solely responsible for managing their enrollment status in a class; nonattendance does not constitute a withdrawal. If you intend to do well you need to be in class.

Electronic Devices Policy:

You may use laptops to take notes in class unless your use becomes a distraction to me or other students in the class. Turn off all phones. If you have some sort of emergency call you are expecting, let me know before class begins. No electronic devices may be on your desk during an exam.

Classroom rules:

It is very distracting to both me and other students when you leave and return to the room during class, so PLEASE don't leave unless you have some sort of genuine emergency. If you do have emergencies, I expect they will be few and far between. Furthermore, cell phones and the like are distracting: turn them off before class starts. Talking when I'm talking or when someone else is not only distracting, it's rude. I'll be happy to answer questions to give time for discussion, so just be patient.

Course Assessments/Assignments:

- 3 essay exams to be turned on D2L Drop Box, each exam counts for 30% of your grade;
- 10% of your grade is for class participation and includes some written work (peer review, analysis of specific readings, and short reflective papers that we will use in class discussion). Participation work must be turned in during class on the day it is due; that is, it is a **participation** assignment so you must be in class to receive credit. It is your responsibility to turn it in on those days. I will also count your participation in class discussions as part of your participation grade.

I will say more about each of these grading categories and particular assignments. Guidelines for these assignments and particular reading assignments are posted on D2L. It is your responsibility to look at these guidelines and reading assignments. I will not accept assignments over email.

Makeup Exams and Late Assignments:

Due dates for your exams are listed on the syllabus schedule, and they **must** be submitted on D2L Drop Box where I will grade them. I will not accept exams more one class period late; that is, if a paper/exam is due in Drop Box Monday at noon, then I will not accept it after noon on Wednesday and any late exams will receive a grade penalty of one letter grade. (The exception to this is the final, which must be turned in at the time listed.) In-class activities that are part of your

participation grade (peer review and announced reading analysis) will not be accepted late. I will have the plagiarism detecting function enabled on Drop Box. If you have difficulties with Drop Box, **contact the D2L administrator immediately and copy me on your email**. I cannot submit exams to your account on D2L Drop Box, and I will **only** accept them on Drop Box. Submissions to Drop Box must be as a .doc file, an .rtf file or as a PDF.

Grading:

I grade your essays on the plus, minus system. While I can't give this as a final grade, it allows me to see clearly where you fall in the grading range. If you want a numerical calculation for the essays you can assign each grade a number for 1 to 11 as follows:

A 11

A- 10

B+ 9

B 8

B- 7 and so forth. Then, divide by the number of assignments in the grading category and you have an overall grade in that category. Then you average the category grades together. Or, too make things simpler, if you have an A and a C the averaged grade is a B.

I follow University policy in giving incompletes: **I**—Indicates an incomplete grade for the course, and will be awarded only when the student has done satisfactory work up to the last two weeks of the semester, but for nonacademic reasons beyond his/her control is unable to meet the full requirements of the course. Incomplete grades are only valid after submission of the Incomplete Grade form (signed by both the instructor and student) to the Department Chair's office.
